

^{122}Pd

In 1994, Bernas et al. published the discovery of ^{122}Pd in “Projectile fission at relativistic velocities: A novel and powerful source of neutron-rich isotopes well suited for in-flight isotopic separation” ([1994Be24](#)). The isotope was produced using projectile fission of ^{238}U at 750 MeV/nucleon on a lead target at GSI, Germany. “Forward emitted fragments from ^{80}Zn up to ^{155}Ce were analyzed with the Fragment Separator (FRS) and unambiguously identified by their energy-loss and time-of-flight.” This experiment yielded 79 counts of ^{122}Pd .
