

¹³¹Cd

¹³¹Cd was first discovered in 2000 by Hannawald as reported in the article “Selective Laser Ionization of very neutron-rich cadmium isotopes: Decay properties of ¹³¹Cd and ¹³²Cd” (2000Ha55). A uranium-carbide/graphite target was bombarded by 1 GeV protons at CERN. ¹³¹Cd was separated and identified using a resonance-ionization laser ion-source at ISOLDE. “For the new $N = 83$ isotope ¹³¹Cd a half-life of $T_{1/2} = (68 \pm 3)$ ms has been obtained, which is unanticipatedly short when compared to current model predictions.”
