

¹⁷⁰Eu

¹⁷⁰Eu was discovered in 2022 by Kiss et al. as reported in “Measuring the β -decay Properties of Neutron-rich Exotic Pm, Sm, Eu, and Gd Isotopes to Constrain the Nucleosynthesis Yields in the Rare-earth Region” (2022Ki23). A 345 MeV/nucleon ²³⁸U primary beam impinged on a 5 mm thick ⁹Be target at the RIKEN Nishina Center and the fragmentation products were separated with the large-acceptance BigRIPS separator and deposited in the AIDA implantation detector which consisted of a stack of six double-sided silicon strip detectors. “Only a few hundred (or even fewer) ions of the most neutron-rich isotopes (¹⁶⁶Pm, ^{167,168}Sm, ¹⁷⁰Eu, and ^{170–172}Gd) were implanted in the AIDA detector.” ¹⁷⁰Eu had previously been reported in an RIKEN accelerator progress report (2015FuZX).
